



Corporal Terrell was a member of Company A, 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division.

He was taken Prisoner of War while fighting the enemy in North Korea on November 26, 1950 and died while a prisoner on July 2, 1951.

His remains were not recovered.

Captured in 1950.

Corpl. Terrell, a native of Madison County, Va., was reported missing on November 26, 1950, in North Korea. His parents, however, were not notified until May of 1951.

When captured, Corpl. Terrell was 30 years old and a veteran of seven years in the service. During World War II, he served with the Air Force in Europe and Japan. After a year of civilian life, he re-enlisted and was sent to Korea in the fall of 1950.

Months after his capture, Mr. and Mrs. Terrell, who live on Gunston road near Lorton, received confirmation of the event. A captain of the 9th Infantry

Regiment, of which the soldier was a member in Korea, wrote that his company, near Kunu-ri, North Korea, was "attacked by a strong enemy force which overran his company positions."

In August, 1951, the Terrells got a letter from their son, beginning, "I am in the North Korean prison camp."

In the letter, he asked for cookies and candy. He also asked to have his love sent to a girl named Theresa.
